ANSWERS

1. Ans. B.

In the highlighted part, "to" must be omitted to maintain a parallel structure. According to the rule of parallelism, elements in a sentence that have the same function or express similar ideas should be grammatically parallel, or grammatically matched. Since "go" and "waste" are verbs in their base forms, the usage of the infinitive "to attend" is inappropriate and should be replaced by "attend". Thus, option B is correct.

2. Ans. B.

"Both" is used to refer to two things or people together. And to link the two entities, the conjunction "and" is used and not "as well as". Thus, option B is the correct answer. The usage of "many" indicates that there are more than one house, thus, option C is incorrect.

3. Ans. C.

There are two errors in the highlighted segment. First of all, "not only... but also" is used when we have two things and we want to give a little extra emphasis to the second thing. In the given part "not only" should not be placed before the verb but before the noun "sunshine" as "but also" is placed before the noun "cold nights", thus laying emphasis on it.

Secondly, "chilled" is an inappropriate adjective for "nights" and it should be "chilling" instead. Thus, option C is the correct answer.

4. Ans. C.

A performance is given "by" someone and not "through" him or her. The term "mesmerisation of the audience" is incorrect and since Leena is the doer of the action, the part should be rephrased as "who mesmerised the audience with her performances". Option C carries the correct replacement, thus, it is the correct answer.



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5. Ans. D.

In the sentence which is based on 'too... ... to' format, we cannot replace 'to' with 'so that'. If we replace 'to' with 'so that', 'too' also must be replaced with 'cannot'. Thus, both the phrases, 'too divided to remove him' as well as 'so divided that it cannot remove him', are correct.

6. Ans. A.

The phrase, 'to know the ropes' means to have experience of the appropriate procedures. Hence, the correct answer is option A.

7. Ans. D.

The context of the sentence makes it clear that the service providers will suffer from "white flu". The most appropriate phrasal verb to depict this idea is "come down with" which means to begin to suffer from (a specified illness).

The meanings of the other phrasal verbs are: Come up with—produce (something), especially when pressured or challenged Come across—meet or find by chance Come out with—say (something) in a sudden, rude, or incautious way

Come down on— criticize or punish (someone) harshly

8. Ans. E.

"Clamp down on" means to suppress or prevent something in an oppressive or harsh manner. The phrasal verb conveys appropriate sense in the given sentence, thus, no correction is required.

"Clamp up" means to become silent suddenly, usually because you are embarrassed or nervous, or do not want to talk about a particular subject. E.G. She clamps up the moment you want her to open up about her traumatic past.

The other options do not convey correct meanings. Thus, option E is the correct answer.

9. Ans. A.

Let us first look at the meanings of the given phrasal verbs.

Turn over— start or continue to run properly Turn down— to refuse or decline a request Turn off— to stop a machine or device from working/performing

Turn in— to submit something

Turn out— audience members, spectators or participants at an event

With reference to the context of the given sentence, the usage of "applied again several years later", implies that the promotion was initially not accepted. Thus, "turn down" is the most appropriate replacement and option A is the correct answer.

10. Ans. A.

'Extracts' is a noun and needs an appropriate adjective to modify it. So "tiny" is more apt than "adventure". The term "adventure journal", on the other hand, makes a proper sense. Thus, 'adventures" should be replaced by "tiny". So, option A is the correct answer.

11. Ans. A.

Savings should be attained by reducing the maintenance and interest costs. This is true for all the cases hence, 1 and 2 must be exchanged. Rest of the words are correct. The correct answer is option A. A fleet is a number of vehicles or aircraft operating together or under the same ownership.

12. Ans. C.

(1): Arid is an adjective which means lacking in interest, excitement, or meaning. This does not fit with the context of the sentence. Instead, it should be replaced by a word which means addictive or keen interest or enthusiasm for green tea.

(2): Jittery is an adjective which means nervous or unable to relax. Thus, this word is correctly used in the context of the sentence.

(3): Parched means to make or to become dry through intense heat. 'Parched in hot water' makes no sense. It should be replaced by a word which means 'soaked'. Thus, apart from the word "soaked", "infusion" can also be used.

The correct word usage would be avid, jittery and steeped respectively to give proper meaning to the statement.

Therefore, option C is the apt answer.

13. Ans. A.

The meaning of the highlighted words as follows:

1. Concede means to admit or agree that something is true after first denying or resisting it. It also means to surrender or yield a possession, right, or privilege. "Concede" and "funds" fit in the sentence. "Seamline" means the joining of two pieces (as of cloth or leather) by sewing usually near the edge. The word does not fit in the context of the sentence. The phrase "by a year"



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indicates that the "deadline" or the end date has been pushed back.

Therefore, option A is the apt answer.

Correct sentence: The RBI didn't **concede** the demand for alignment of the capital norms to Basel, but by pushing back the **deadline** by a year for increasing the capital buffer, it has freed up **funds** for banks to lend.

14. Ans. C.

Option A: going from safety checks is incorrect, hence it can be eliminated.

Option B: 'combine' makes the sentence incorrect.

Option C: All the words fit in the given sentence, hence keep it on hold.

'Other' is used to refer to additional people or things. 'Through' means 'moving in one side and out of the other side to inspect all parts'. 'Part' is a section which when combined with others makes up the whole. 'New' means something which is introduced recently.

Option D: 'flood' makes the sentence incorrect.

Option E: 'going to safety checks' and 'dozen some reactors' don't make sense, hence the given sentence is incorrect.

Hence, option C is the correct answer.

15. Ans. B.

The statement tries to compare the salaries of the soldiers with those of the other professionals and focuses on the disparities in the same. Corresponding to the context 'disproportionate' and 'compensations' are the most suitable words. Disproportionate highlights the disparity and compensation lays stress on the subject being discussed. So, option B is correct.





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
