## ANSWERS

1. Ans. D.

The error is in the $4^{\text {th }}$ part of the sentence. The correct sentence is "The Panama Agreement on which both the nations worked such hard diplomacy will be signed tomorrow." Add 'ed' at the end of the word 'sign' to make it correct as the sentence is in the passive voice. Also, "be" will either be proceeded by present or past participle in such contexts. Hence, option $D$ is the right response.

## 2. Ans. B.

'Proven' should be replaced with 'has proven' or 'proved' to make the sentence grammatically correct. The past participle "proven" would take the verb "has" to make the present perfect tense. Thus, option B is the right response.

## 3. Ans. B.

'A few years back' is a phrase in the given sentence which indicates that the statement is about something in past, thus, 'wonder' should be replaced with 'wondered'. So, option B is correct.

## 4. Ans. B.

The error is in the second part of the sentence. The correct phrase is "in order to+ base form of verb". Thus, "that" must be replaced by "to". The phrase "in order to" is used to indicate a reason. Hence, option $B$ is the right response.
5. Ans. D.

The error lies in part 4 of the sentence where the participle 'achieving' after the conjunction 'and' should be replaced by to-infinitive 'to achieve' in order to maintain parallel structure. Hence, option $D$ is the right response.

## 6. Ans. E.

The sentence is both grammatically and contextually correct. Therefore, option E is the correct answer.
7. Ans. A.

The error is in the first part of the statement. 'Making' needs to be replaced with a causative verb 'made' to make the sentence correct.
8. Ans. B.

Hardly, scarcely and barely are followed by "when" but here in the given sentence when is missing. So the word 'and' in part 2 should be replaced by when to make the sentence correct. Hence there is an error part 2 and option $B$ is the answer.

## 9. Ans. A.

The tense of the sentence is "present tense". Thus, "Had started" will be replaced with "start". Hence option A is the correct response.

## 10. Ans. D.

The error is of preposition is in part (4). Use "in" in the place of "from". Also, we should always use "in" before a year, when we talk about an incident that took place sometime in that particular year. Hence, option D is the correct response.
11. Ans. A.

Only part A is correct.
The error in $B$ is the verb 'take' in present tense which must be present continuous tense 'taking'.
The error in C is the tense 'happened' in simple past as it should be past perfect tense 'had happened' to convey the meaning that something had happened before he was eating. Also "that" should be added in the end.
The error in part D "make" should be replaced by "made". Also, the term 'was he' is incorrect and the pronoun must be placed before the verb 'was'. In interrogative sentences the pronoun is written after the verb. Thus, it should be read as: 'When the child was with his mother taking his breakfast, she asked him what had happened that made him so gloomy, and why he was not not talking to her.'

## 12. Ans. E.

There is no error in the sentence. Thus, option E is the correct answer.
13. Ans. B.

Only part B is correct here.
The error in part $A$ of the sentence is 'would have come' and must be replaced with past perfect tense 'had come' to make the sentence correct. The sentence, here, follows the structure of a conditional sentence which says: if clause $>$ past perfect tense : main clause > would have. Thus, it should read as: 'If the man had come to his father for advice..'
The error in C is the word 'that' which makes no sense here and must be omitted.
The error in $D$ is the verb 'face' which should have been in past tense 'faced' to make the sentence. It should be read as:'..would not have faced.'
14. Ans. B.

Option B is the correct option. The errors in the other parts are as follows:
A- "These" is a plural determiner. Hence, either "questions are" should be used or "This" should be used as the determiner. C- Here "journey" is the subject which is singular, hence, the verb should be singular. Thus, "ends" should be used instead of "end".
D- "Every" should take a singular verb after it. Thus, "stage" should be used.
15. Ans. B.

In part A there should be 'said' in place of 'say' as the sentence is talking about an event that has happened in the past.
In part $C$ there must be 'was' in place of 'were' as the subject (he) is singular.
In part $D$ there is 'biggest' in its superlative form so it is incorrect to use 'more' in front of it. Thus, the correct answer is option B.
16. Ans. C.

The word "Both" is used to refer to two people or things, regarded and identified together. Hence, the use of the phrase "such as" is redundant here. When we are talking about two things together ("both"
in this case), the use of "like" or "such as" alongside gives the impression that out of a number of things, two have been picked to be presented as an example. This makes the sentence incorrect.

## 17. Ans. B.

In the given sentence, since "although" is used in the first clause, it should be followed by a comma or "yet" as a conjunction in the second clause. Hence, option B is correct.
18. Ans. E.

Already means that something happened earlier than we expected. Since the action has already taken place, past tense should be used in both the main verb (sleep) and the conditional clause (it was early).
'Yet' means that something that we expected has happened or hasn't happened.
Hence the correct answer is E .
19. Ans. C.

When we want to convey a continuous action (working) that began in the past and continue to the present, we use the present perfect continuous tense. The speaker started working in the past, and had continued to do so until her boss decided to fire her. Hence the correct option is C.

## 20. Ans. B.

The error in sentence $B$ is that the verb 'believe' is incorrect here and the noun 'belief' should be used here. The sentence needs a noun here and not a verb.
21. Ans. E.

All the options except $E$ either have grammatical errors or have been incoherently structured. Only E makes sense that the concerned person was respected as a player but couldn't prove his point as a manager.
22. Ans. A.

We need to put the words given in the sentence in a way that will render a structurally and grammatically correct sentence.

Statement B states that the main aim of Facebook is to prevent the spread of fake news, which is wrong. Also, widely is missing an auxiliary verb. So, $B$ is wrong. 'Was announced' indicates that an announcement has been made, which should have been the subject of the clause. But here, the subject is the announcer. Also, criticised should have 'was' as its auxiliary verb not 'has'. So, D is wrong.
Sentence E has 2 contradictory situations Facebook criticising fake news and then themselves getting blamed for it. Also, fake news is not a person that can be criticised. When mentioning the action that is to be prevented, we use the preposition 'from'. So, E is wrong. Hence, the correct answer is $A$.

## 23. Ans. D.

We need to put the words given in the sentence in a way that will render a structurally and grammatically correct sentence.
In a clause the structure should be subject + verb + object. But the starting clause of $A$ is just the opposite. The object is followed by the subject. Also, 'named' is missing an auxiliary verb. So, $A$ is wrong.
Any pool could not be used for cooking. And most probably it is little exaggerating the size would be equivalent to that of Rome. So, $B$ is wrong.
Brew means drink made by steeping and boiling and fermenting rather than distilling. Pizza is a solid food, not a drink. Weight means the vertical force exerted by a mass as a result of gravity. It is wrongly used here as a verb is required here. So, C is wrong.

When a whole clause is used as a subject, and there is no conjunction present, the auxiliary verb (was) is skipped. Pounds is the unit and since quantity is plural, 'pounds' is the correct usage. So, E is wrong.
Hence, the correct answer is D.

## 24. Ans. A.

We need to rearrange the jumbled words to make a structurally and grammatically correct statement. All the options except A have grammatical errors. Only A makes sense and the phrase 'over the past four centuries' indicates 'throughout these years'. 'Having been' shows that a clause is required in support of it, and as a clause is not present thus 'having been' will not be used.

## 25. Ans. C.

We need to put the words given in the sentence in a way that will render a structurally and grammatically correct sentence.
'In spite of' is used to convey the meaning 'nevertheless'. This means that the clause ' relying on its readers to fund it' should have been followed by a clause stating a condition that couldn't be stopped even after the readers funded it. So, $A$ is wrong.
Since 'to' is always followed by the first form of the verb, 'funding' will get replaced by 'fund'. So, B is wrong.
The tense of the whole statement is in future i.e. Wikitribune is a thing of the future. But, $C$ claims that it is preexisting. This is illogical. So, D is wrong. 'to' will be followed by the first form of the verb .i.e. 'fund'. So, E is wrong.
Hence, the correct answer is C.

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
