Fair wind: On IMD's projection of good monsoon

The article concentrates on the fact that Monsoons are likely to be 101% of the LPA of 88cm. Note that the rainfall was in surplus in the last two years too. It is good news for India that Agricultural zones may have an 'above normal' rainfall.

Though the pattern has always been that Northeastern India used to observe higher base rainfall. But this time the case is different, and central India is expected to have stronger rainfall. Even the IOD conditions are negative, which is positive news for Monsoons in India.

A good monsoon has always benefited agriculture and India being one of the largest agricultural economies. On the contrary, a surplus rainfall brings along the threats of floods, landslides, etc. The inputs from deployed monsoon models must be used by the Government to work on infrastructural facilities such that the gains in the agriculture sector do not get wiped off due to losses on the former grounds.
