The growing protests against the ban on the bull-taming sport of Jallikattu in Tamil Nadu shed light on yet another case of misplaced animal rights and judicial activism. In 2014, the Supreme Court had banned Jallikattu on the ground that bulls could not be allowed as performing animals. However, Jallikattu is an age-old tradition in Tamil Nadu and continues to enjoy significant popularity. It is intrinsically linked to the rural-agrarian economy of the state where only the best bulls from indigenous species are reared for Jallikattu.

While NGOs and animal rights activists have asserted that bulls are 'tortured' in Jallikattu and have drawn comparisons with Spanish bull-fighting, this is far from reality. In fact, Jallikattu is an event where the best bulls are displayed and the ones that win are sought for breeding by farmers. Thus, there's no question of harming the bulls as they serve an important economic and cultural function. In that sense, Jallikattu plays a significant part in preserving and propagating native cattle breeds in Tamil Nadu.

The argument that engaging the bulls in sport itself is cruelty doesn't cut ice either. Agriculture in Tamil Nadu is getting mechanised and farmers cannot afford to keep bulls simply as pets. Would animal rights activists prefer that the bulls be sold and slaughtered for meat? Besides, the Jallikattu ban is hardly enforceable as benign cultural practices enjoying widespread support can't be curbed through **fiat**. In fact, the issue has seen Tamil Nadu's rival political parties – AIADMK and DMK – both oppose the ban. Chief Minister O Panneerselvam has met the Prime Minister to push for an ordinance to allow Jallikattu. However, the PM's office has merely observed that the matter is sub judice as the Supreme Court is currently seized of petitions challenging the Centre's year-old notification allowing Jallikattu.

If the ruling party wishes to make political inroads in Tamil Nadu it makes sense for the national ruling party to explore the ordinance route on Jallikattu, or alternatively to bring an amendment to the original prevention of animal cruelty legislation in the upcoming parliamentary session to allow Jallikattu. As far as the Supreme Court is concerned, it must stick to its remit of narrowly interpreting the law. Judicial activism should not morph into social engineering projects. On Jallikattu, it would suffice if the apex court regulates the sport rather than prescribe a wholesale ban.

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###ANSWERS###

1. Ans. C.

Refer to the following lines from the passage “..Jallikattu is an age-old tradition in Tamil Nadu and continues to enjoy significant popularity. It is intrinsically linked to the rural-agrarian economy of the state..” These lines imply that the sport is an inherent part of the Tamil culture.

2. Ans. D.

Throughout the above passage the author gave reasons why Jallikattu should continue and see no ban from the Supreme Court. He refers the sport as “benign cultural practice”. Also, in paragraph one and two the evident support of the author is seen. Thus, the tone of the author is understood to be supportive.

3. Ans. B.

“Fiat” means ‘a formal authorization or proposition; a decree’. All the given words except ‘testament’ are similar to ‘fiat’. ‘Testament’ means ‘a person’s will, especially the part relating to personal property’. Thus, option B is the correct answer.

4. Ans. A.

The sentence states that he was very much angry moments ago, but it could not be told from the gentle and kind look of his face. Thus, ‘benign’, which means ‘gentle and kind’, fits in the blank to make the sentence grammatically and contextually correct. Therefore, the correct answer is option A.

5. Ans. E.

Refer to the last line of the passage “On Jallikattu, it would suffice if the apex court regulates the sport rather than prescribe a wholesale ban”. Thus, the correct answer is option E.

6. Ans. C.

Both I and II are the reasons for the author supporting the ban on the bull-taming sport. But III is not the reason. Rather, it is an effect. It is due to I and II these parties are against the ban. Thus, option C is the correct answer.

7. Ans. E.

After carefully reading the above three statements we can easily understand that all are same in meaning. Thus, option E is the correct answer.

8. Ans. A.

The ‘but also’ after the highlighted part means it should be ‘not also’ after ‘abortion’. Also, since the verb following ‘but also’ in simple present tense (results), the verb following the ‘not only’ should also be in simple present tense (prevents). Hence, the correct answer is A.

9. Ans. C.

The adverb ‘simply’ is describing another adverb ‘around’. ‘Simple’ is an adjective and cannot be used for the same. Here the use of the adverb ‘simply’ has been done to assert ‘only’, thereby contextually indicating that the political



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legitimacy in some countries is not based on formal election results only, but it also depends on material resources and power that rise from such processes.

Owing to this, option A is incorrect as it uses the adjective 'simple' instead of the adverb 'simply'. Option II is incorrect according to the structure and use of 'simply' and 'only'. Thus, only option III is correct here.

So, only option iii is correct. Hence, the answer is C.

10. Ans. E.

In statement I, "in spite" needs to be followed by 'of'. 'Complexion' is a noun which means the natural colour, texture, and appearance of a person's skin, especially of the face and hence is inappropriate in the given context. Hence, the correct answer is E.

11. Ans. A.

In segment A, a chain of concepts is given one by one, and hence after geography we can expect this chain to have more additions. F starts with "and gender" and is fit to follow the series of similar concepts given in segment A. Segment C and E can be joined together as they complete the structure of the correlative conjunction "not only .. but also", used to present two related pieces of information. C talks about one effect of exclusionary form of nationalism i.e. two world wars and E talks about another, i.e. promotion of colonisation of Asia and Africa.

12. Ans. B.

So, the correct answer is option B.

15. Ans. A.

Unless (used to introduce the case in which a statement being made is not true or valid), which means "except if", is already a word with negative connotation. There is no need to use any additional word with negative meaning. Thus, "does not clear" should be replaced by "clears". So, the correct answer is option A.

16. Ans. D.



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Replace "into" by "to". "Rotten to the core" means rotten from within. So, the correct answer is option D.

17. Ans. E.

The sentence is grammatically and idiomatically correct.

18. Ans. B.

From 'almost violently' and defiance which refers to behaviour in which you refuse to obey someone or something, we can decipher that the word in the blank should mean 'harsh/rude/abrupt.'

Option a: Gruff means a voice which is rough and low in pitch. It also means abrupt or taciturn in manner.

Option b: Curt means 'rudely brief.'

Option c: Tactful means having or showing skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues.

Option d: Benign means gentle and kind.

The correct combination is a-b.

Therefore, option B is the apt answer.

19. Ans. B.

Janus-faced is an adjective which means having two sharply contrasting aspects or characteristics. From the sentence, one can clearly make out that the word in the blank should mean 'divided.'

Option a: Malignant is an adjective which means something/someone evil in nature or effect.

Option b: Bifurcated is a verb which means divided into two parts or branches.

Option c: Forked is an adjective which means having a divided or pronged end or branches

Option d: Allied is an adjective which means joined by or relating to members of an alliance.

The correct combination is b-c.

Therefore, option B is the apt answer.

20. Ans. A.

If the battle flags are flying up or opened, then the thoughts of men will be engaged upon how to conquer the battle. But if it is rolled up or folded, then thoughts of men will be engaged upon the best means of establishing and safeguarding a permanent and worldwide peace. So, the word in the blank should mean 'folded/fasten/rolled up.'

Option a: Furled means to roll or fold up something neatly and securely.

Option b: Uncoil means to straighten or cause to straighten from a coiled or curled position.

Option c: Bolted means to fasten something to something else with a long pin that screws into a nut.

Option d: Released means to allow something to move, act, or flow freely.

The correct combination is a-c.

Therefore, option A is the apt answer.



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21. Ans. A.

For: used as a function word to indicate duration of time or extent of space. (as in, for a little while)

In: used as a function word to indicate inclusion, location, or position within limits. (which is contextually inappropriate)

Thus, the preposition 'in' in the first part of the sentence needs to be replaced with 'for' to be contextually correct.

22. Ans. E.

The idiom 'cut the ground from under' means to make someone or their ideas or actions seem less good, especially by doing something before them or better than them.

As the idiom fits perfectly in the blank, no improvement is required here.

23. Ans. E.

The sentence is talking about the threat that the nuclear arms race poses at a global level. All the given phrases depict the same meaning.

Hence, the correct answer is **option E**.

24. Ans. A.

The error lies in first part of the sentence. 'Giving' is a present participle form of give whereas 'given' is the past participle. Here the word 'given' means 'taking into account'. The context of the sentence is that taking into account the recent flurry of press coverage and the spike in concerns which is appropriately implied by the use of 'given' acting as a preposition. 'Giving' as an adjective implies providing love or other emotional support; caring. So, the correct answer is option A.

25. Ans. C.

This question tests you for parallelism. There are two possible parallel structures:

(i) Mr Pillai, X and Y, will be ...

(ii) Mr Pillai, who is X and also Y, will be ... (use of who-clause)

There are also other ways to express the same idea but with different shades of meaning/emphasis:

(iii) Since Mr Pillai is X and Y, he will be ... (two main clauses joined by 'some' as a conjunction).

(iv) Being X and Y, Mr Pillai will be ... (use of participial clause).

Answer choice (C) matches with (i) above. Other choices do not match with any of the other possible grammatical structures.

26. Ans. D.

To keep one's card close to the chest means to keep one's plans and intentions secret. So if a party does not reveal its plans, any 'speculation' will get dismissed. None of the other words fit in the first blank space.

For the second blank, we require a verb in its base form, thus, options A and B can be eliminated. Since something in relation to government formation is



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being kept secret, 'announce' is the best-fit word for the second blank. So, option D is the correct answer.

27. Ans. E.

The sentence is grammatically and systematically correct. Hence, option E is the answer.

28. Ans. E.

The idiom "off their rockers" means to go mad or slightly crazy. This expression is used in a light-hearted, slightly humorous sense. The above sentence talks about how people go crazy whenever a celebrity comes in their town. The word "Beatific" means joyful, "glum" means sad, "Incapacitated" and "fragile" means weak and none of these words go with the meaning of the idiom. Hence, option E is correct.

29. Ans. E.

Government is the subject in the statement and is considered as a singular entity, so a singular form of verb should be used along with it, so only option B, D and E are relevant. Now, as the context is about future tense, thus option D is eliminated as it uses a verb in the past form. Between B and E, the distinction is of context; industry generates 'revenue', not 'service'.
