What is Inclusive Growth?

According to the definition given by UNDP, inclusive growth can be defined as "the process and result of all groups of people participating in the organization of growth and benefiting equitably from it." This means that growth can be considered inclusive if it includes all the sections of society as the beneficiaries.

Introduction to Inclusive growth

- Inclusive growth can be considered as the holistic growth of a society that provides them with the best option for livelihood and employment.
- Beneficiaries of inclusive growth are provided with access to the services important for living, like good health, quality education, equal opportunities at the workplace, and the empowerment of women through education and skill development.
- According to the OECD, inclusive growth is defined as economic growth that is distributed fairly across society and creates an opportunity for all.
- Inclusive growth always focuses on environmentally friendly growth and good governance that helps create a gender-sensitive society.

Elements of an Inclusive growth

There are various elements that contribute to inclusive growth. Let's have a look at them.

Skill development

- According to the economic survey, in 2017, more than 31% of you in India were not in education, employment, or training.
- In fact, a UNICEF report said that more than 45% of youth in India are not interested in grabbing the quality education and necessary skills for employment.
- It can be fairly believed that India has the challenge of providing proper skill development to its workforce due to the scarcity of highly trained workers and providing employment opportunities for conventionally trained workers.

Technological development

Digital India Mission:

The Indian government has taken some big and equitable measures to promote inclusive growth. They want to prepare an inclusive policy framework with citizens at the center. These measures are-

- National Urban Livelihood Mission
- Government is actively working with NGOs and International groupings in policy making. Projects like DISHA are being implemented. DISHA is being implemented in partnership with the UNDP with the aim of creating entrepreneurial opportunities and employment.
- NITI Aayog has started working on the Strategy for New India@75 which has the following objectives for inclusive growth:
 - Rapid growth (9-10% by 2022-23) that is inclusive, sustainable, and clean.
 - Technological inclusion for sustainable, participatory and inclusive development by 2022-23.
 - Work to ensure that the subjugated of the society (migrants, slum dwellers and urban poor) are included in city services.
 - Make schools more inclusive by addressing and working on barriers that are related to the physical environment (accesible toilets), admission process, and curriculum.
 - Make higher education accessible and inclusive for the subjugated groups.
 - Provision for top-notch ambulatory services for best rehabilitative, diagnostic and curative care.
